Demonstration	New Life for Old Maps; Cloud-Based Workflows Integrating Historical Cartographic Materials  Kristina Larsen, Stanford University Libraries  Description: The participants will be exposed to key concepts related to digitization, discovery, distribution, and use of historical maps. The presenter will provide a live demonstration of a workflow for discovering relevant historical maps using Al-enabled search, locating and copying a IIIF (International Image Interoperability Framework)-compliant manifest URL associated with that image, employing AllMaps Editor to georeference the image (meaning associate the file with the location on earth represented by the map) and generate XYZ map tiles, culminating in the integration of the map tiles in a cloud-based GIS software. Potential applications for this technology and implications for contemporary scholarship using historical cartographic materials will also be discussed.
